A tag is a classification for your writing that makes it easier for others to find it. If you're writing about cricket, you might tag your post 'Sport', 'Cricket', 'Batsmen', etc. Tags can bring together different views on the same topic or make connections between otherwise different posts. For example, the "Cameron" tag on My Telegraph collates posts from readers who support David Cameron, readers who oppose him and others who are simply indifferent. Meanwhile, the "pop music" tag includes discussion of the likes of Prince and The Beatles but, in the past 48 hours, reactions to the Eurovision Song Contest dominate.

1 HOW TO REGISTER

- Go to telegraph.co.uk/mytelegraph and click the *Sign Up* link.
- Choose a screen name - this is the name that will appear at the top of your page and on any comments you leave.
- Tell us your name, email address and choose a password.
- If you accept our terms and conditions, click *I accept*. Create my account to move to stage two.
- Tell us where you live and enter a few words to describe yourself. These words will appear on your page. Then choose an image to illustrate your blog. You can select one from our library or upload a picture of yourself from a folder on your computer. Finally, give your blog a

subtitle - for example *My thoughts on the world*. Don't worry if you change your mind later - you can go back and edit or change this at any time.

- Click *Join the debate* and you're ready to go.

2 START WRITING

- From the My Telegraph front page, click *My Blog* in the menu bar.
- This will take you to your page. Underneath your name is a large *Write a blog* post link. Click this and

you're ready to go.

- In the box that says *Enter blog post's title*, write a headline for this blog post.
- In the larger box underneath write your blog post. You can format the text, using bold or italics, by using the buttons above the box.
- When you are finished, click *Preview* and check that you are happy with what you have written.
- Now click *Tag* to add labels to your blog post. This makes it easier for other readers to find. First give the post a category from the pull-down menu - for example *Animals and pets*. If you want, you can add other tags of your own. Put a comma between each tag.
- When you are happy, click *Publish* and your blog will appear online almost immediately.

1. HOW TO COMMENT ON ANOTHER BLOG

- You can join the debate with other readers and comment on a blog.
- After reading the post you want to comment on, scroll down to the comment box at the bottom of the page.
- Give your comment a headline - for example *I agree with you completely* - and then write your comment in the box underneath.
- If you make a mistake you can clear the box by clicking *Clear form*.
- Otherwise, if you are happy with your comment click *Submit this comment*.

2. HOW TO VOTE ON ANOTHER BLOG

- At the top of each blog

USING THE ADVANCED FEATURES

post, to the right of the first paragraph, is an Agreement Index. This shows how many people agree with the post you are reading.

- To add your vote, click *Agree* or *Disagree* as appropriate.

3. HOW TO ADD OTHER READERS TO YOUR PAGE

- If you find a blogger whose posts you enjoy and want to be notified when they write something in future, you can easily add them to your network.

- Go to the blogger's page or open one of their posts.
- In the *Blog options* box in the top right of the page (underneath the tags) find the link titled *Add to network*. You can use this feature to keep in close contact with friends, family members who may be living far away, or members of a club.
- Click that link and the blogger will be added to your page and every time they write a post it will appear in the *Recent Activity* tab on your page.

- If you need help with any aspect of My Telegraph, click on the *About link* in the menu bar. At the bottom of the *About page* there is an email link. Click on this and type your question into the email box.

10 TIPS FOR BLOGGING**1 TRY TO BE CONCISE**

two short posts are better than one long article.

2 HOOK IN YOUR READERS EARLY

many readers will only see the first paragraph of your post on the homepage.

3 USE TAGS

the more tags you add to your post, the easier it will be for other people to find.

4 USE TAGS AGAIN

if you write more than once about the same subject, make sure you use the same tags.

5 USE OTHER PEOPLE'S TAGS

if you're writing about the same subject as other people, match your tags to theirs.

6 WRITE REGULARLY

three or more posts per week will help you build an audience.

7 BE PATIENT

building an audience can take a while but you'll get there if you keep posting.

8 JOIN IN

comment on blogs by other readers and they will be more likely to read yours.

9 EXPERIMENT

try posting pictures, riddles, your recipes or whatever you like.

10 HAVE FUN

don't be afraid to join in.

THE BURGEONING BLOGOSPHERE

There are thought to be more than 70 million blogs worldwide. The phenomenon has gone from being a way for geeks to share links in the days before Google to being a primary way for people to keep in touch with friends and family and to share their opinions on all manner of subjects and events. A 2006 survey by Microsoft found that 25 per cent of Britons had started some form of online diary. Predictably, the proportion was higher among under 25s but the survey found that a quarter of 35-44 year olds and 13 per cent of those aged 45 and over were already blogging. In the past few days more than 1,250 Telegraph readers have joined them.

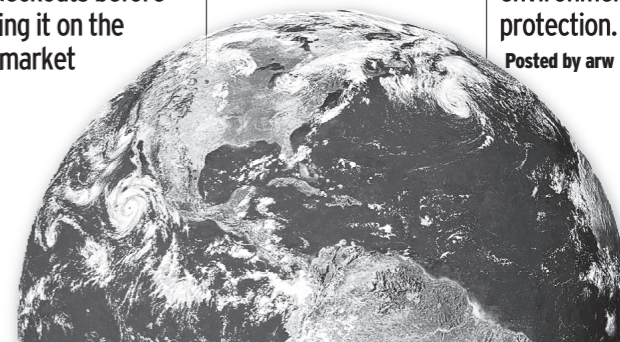
WE'RE SO BEHIND WITH RECYCLING OUR WASTE
