MOST Royals might be content to just shake hands and accept flowers — but the Duchess of Cornwall was so charmed by a group of blind and partially sighted Exeter students she ended up on the floor playing with them.

Camilla began a two-day visit to

Exeter yesterday by visiting children at the West of England School and College for children with little or no sight, in Topsham Road.

The Duchess, looking slim in a fitted blue suit, seemed relaxed as she chatted to staff and students, even kneeling down to talk to younger children and letting them

play with her jewellery.

She seemed touched as one severely disabled child called out 'Camilla" as she toured a class-

Thrilled pupil Hannah Linfield, who was 17 on Tuesday, said meeting the Duchess was a "great late birthday present"

Camilla was particularly taken with Hannah's guide dog Bella, who she has had for three weeks.

'She told me how dogs can be great companions and how joyful they can be," said Hannah, who comes from Saltash.

The Duchess was handed a posy of pink flowers by 10-year-old William Parry, from Wells in Somerset, as his proud mum Elizabeth watched nearby.

"I did feel really nervous before I met her but she was really nice and also visited me in my classroom," William said.

William was pushed in his wheelchair to present the posy by 14-year-old Sophia Needs, from Watchet in Somerset.

"She just said thank you very much and asked me how long I'd been at the school and said the flowers were lovely.

Harryot Powell also met Camilla as she was being taught about archaeology.

'She was quite surprised about what we were learning about, Harryot said.

The Duchess was firstly shown to the school's hall to see an exhibition of its work in helping youngsters to live normal lives and become physically active.

She spoke to Tom West, a member of the skiing team, and was fascinated to hear about his suc-

"She found it amazing how I could change direction," said Tom, 15, who also told Camilla how he completed the recent Ten Tors Ju-

bilee Challenge using a tricycle.
Pupils also demonstrated the way they are trained to cross

Ian Morrison, 20, showed Camilla the specially designed kitchen for the West of England's college students. It has cupboards which move up and down, and talking appliances.

'She showed a very keen interest when I demonstrated it," Ian said.

The Duchess asked Mark Saunders, 19, another college student, about his work and life.

'She said 'it was very nice to meet vou'. I was nervous at first but it was OK after a while," Mark
